

FROM THE CEO

I'm not sure where 2021 went! It hardly seems possible that the calendar now reads 2022. While the old year saw a lot of activity at Bonnet House like the completion of the new Boat House Bridge, the completion of the South Gate improvements, partial rebuilding of the Studio window, and the start of a multi-year project to restore paintings

by Frederic Bartlett, the new year will be even busier.

Installing climate control in the Main House has been a long-known need for the museum. Bonnet House is now finalizing plans to install air conditioning in the Drawing Room and second floor bedrooms. While



this will undoubtedly improve the summer visitor experience, its primary benefit will be providing more stable humidity and temperature levels to preserve collection items. The system will be a combination of units including central air conditioning and mini split units. A partial upgrade to the electrical system is also part of the plan. When complete, Bonnet House will be in a position to consider soft furnishing, floor, and painting restoration projects in both the Master Bedroom and Hugh Taylor Birch's room. A fresh coat of paint in the Drawing Room is under consideration as well.

Bonnet House also plans to finalize plans for reroofing the Main House in early 2022. We are coming to the end of the bidding process and will soon be selecting a contractor



to perform the work. Due to our extremely busy wedding and event season, roofing work won't begin until May, but we are also cognizant of supply chain issues and are working to finalize the plan and get materials ordered.

As many readers know, Bonnet House is accredited by the American Alliance of Museums and that

accreditation expires in 2022. The museum is now in the midst of the reaccreditation process. A required self-study and various accompanying documents were submitted to the AAM in November. Additional documents and clarification were



submitted in December. March will see a site visit to thoroughly review our day-to-day operations. The site visit team will consist of two working museum professionals who will participate in some of our programs, inspect the facility, and meet with key staff and select board members. Their report, along with all materials submitted by Bonnet House will be the basis for the reaccreditation commission's decision in the summer.

The winter months will also see our peak visitation season, return of art classes, Concerts Under the Stars, the lecture series, and planning for the Orchid Festival that will take place on April 2nd and 3rd. Add to those events almost twice the number of weddings and private event rentals that Bonnet House sees in a typical season, and you have a very busy few months coming up.

All of this is made possible by a fantastic combination of a talented staff, a dedicated board, and volunteers who give so tirelessly of their time, talent and treasure too. While we are all privileged to be the temporary stewards of this special place, Bonnet House is blessed to have the human talent to nurture its existence. Thanks to each of you for all you do!



STUDIO WINDOW RESTORATION PROJECT

Many of you have been watching the craftsman James R. Baxter toil away restoring the huge north-facing window in the Studio. The window is original to the house. It was designed by Frederic Clay Bartlett to supply the best lighting for painting in an art studio. Natural or full-spectrum light provides the most consistent light throughout the day. We know from historic photographs that Mr. Bartlett had large north-facing windows in his other art studios in New York City, Chicago, Illinois and Lake Geneva, Wisconsin.

The Chicago Tribune described his studio there: "The studio is probably 40 X 25 feet; the ceiling perhaps is twenty feet high. For painting huge decorative canvases an unusably high pitch was required and obtained partly by lowering the floor and partly by elevating the ceiling."

Jim Baxter does his restoration work based in his home in West Palm Beach. A former Andersen Windows sales representative he goes to window restoration workshops and considers his work

a "vocational revival." His attitude has come full circle, and he now truly values old windows that he feels are the "soul of a home." He thinks restoring windows honors the history of an historic structure. Unfortunately the craft is rarely being passed on to the future generations. Schiller's Architectural and Design Salvage yard in Tampa Bay is one of

the few places that you can find unique salvaged items. Wood Window Makeovers, also in Tampa Bay, restore historic windows. It was through a referral from them that we were lucky enough to find Jim to come to Bonnet House and work on the Studio window.

Jim used a lift to access the top part of the Studio window. He first identified the spots with rot. The original glazing was very hard and had mildewed due to moisture penetration. Jim replaced it with putty mixed with zinc-oxide to minimize the mildew in our damp South Florida environment. His work is much like how a doctor does surgery, slowly removing away the rotted wood.

The large Studio window had been restored and parts replaced in the past. The work Jim has been doing is essentially a re-do of the past restorations. He replaced some of the framing members with a "Dutchmen" made of Accoya wood. Accoya is a fast-growing pine tree (pinus radiate) which is sustainably grown in managed forests. This type of wood is known for its high performance. A Dutchman is a matching piece of wood used to replace a small damaged area that has been cut out of a larger portion to avoid having to replace

the entire piece. An acetic acid is injected into the wood to deter bugs and rot and make it extremely stable and durable.

Jim feels the hardest part of a window repair job is working around the existing tempered glass, removing the old hardened calking. Care must be used as the glass is tempered. Unlike regular glass, which fractures into large irregular shaped shards, tempered glass when broken fractures into small relatively harmless pieces. It is four times stronger than regular glass.

The glass in the Studio window has a wavy irregular appearance. This old glass was originally in a cylindrical shape and then cut and flattened. Modern glass is poured out onto a bed of molten tin and allowed to flatten producing a perfectly flat surface.
